

Article 5 by Kristen Simmons



And then there's Jamie. Irresistible. Off-limits.




Head of the River by Pip Harry


I Am Juliet by Jackie French


The Crystal Heart by Sophie Masson


Writing Clementine by Kate Gordon


As Stars Fall by Christie Nieman


Counting By 7's by Holly Goldberg Sloan


The Child's Elephant by Rachel Campbell- Johnston


Rebel by Amy Tintera
